Become an Intern with the Office of the Attorney General

The Department of Law ("Department") offers unpaid internships and externships for school credit to first, second and third -year law students. This is a great opportunity to gain first-hand experience and course credit.

Qualifications

Interns must be in their first, second or third year of law school, and successfully complete a criminal background check and fingerprint check. Internships during the Summer require a full-time commitment of at least 10 weeks. Internships during the Fall and Spring typically involve a part-time commitment of one or two days a week. We welcome and encourage applications from students from all diverse backgrounds.

Hiring Schedule

Each section has a limited number of internship positions, and these positions are filled on a rolling basis beginning nine months in advance. The Department offers opportunities for internships in the Fall, Spring, and Summer. The Department starts reviewing applications for its Summer internships beginning September 1 each year, with the majority of Summer internships filled by December 1. A limited number of Summer internships are reserved for interviews during the February prior to the Summer session. Part-time internships for Spring and Fall semesters are available based on the same application cycle.



Application Process

To submit your application, send an e-mail to *intern.resume@coag.gov* containing a cover letter (attn: Intern Review Committee), resume, short writing sample (10 pages or less), and unofficial transcript (first-year students may apply without a transcript, but must supplement their application with a transcript as soon as grades are received).

The cover letter should include a statement of why the applicant wishes to work for the office, if the applicant has a preference for one or more sections, and how the applicant can add value to our culture of diversity.

Applicants will receive an e-mail acknowledging receipt of their application. Should an applicant be selected for an interview, he or she will be contacted by an attorney from the Department.

NOTE: The Criminal Justice and Natural Resources sections do not accept first-year law students.
